- **The Tribute System (*Poliudie*):** Every winter, the Rus' rulers left their fortified towns to travel among neighboring Slavic tribes, collecting tribute in the form of furs, wax, honey, and enslaved people. In the spring, these goods were loaded onto massive fleets of monoxyla (hollowed-out log boats) and sailed down to Black Sea markets.
